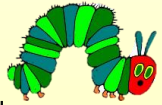

### Phonics

**ci**

Pronounced 'thee', like the start of 'think'.

Examples:

cinco – five – thee-n-ko

ciruela – plum – thee-ru-ay-la

**rr**

Like a rolling 'urr', the tongue is used just behind the teeth to make a trilling/drilling 'r' sound. It can be quite tricky to make as we do not have any phonemes like it in English.

Examples:

perro – dog , guitarra - guitar
