

Here are some questions that may help you to support your children's reading and enjoyment of the stories that they choose. It is not expected that you ask every question every time they read a book to you or that you stick to only these questions. However, by choosing 2 or 3 of the questions to ask your child before, during and after the reading of their book, it will support their developing comprehension of what they read and most importantly, their enjoyment of the books that they choose. The questions listed can be used for any level of text that your child is reading and can also be adapted for other text types e.g. comics, newspapers, leaflets, information on signs, recipes, song lyrics)
