When 'g' is followed by the letter 'o' in Spanish, it makes a hard 'g' as in the English word 'get'.

Examples:

Un gol – a goal

Una goma – an eraser

h

Although not new, remember the letter 'h' at the start of a word in Spanish is a silent letter.

Examples:

Hola (ola) – hello

Hay (sounds like eye) – there is/there are

Grammar

El/un – the/a
masculine singular

Los/unos – the/some
masculine plural

La/una – the/a
feminine singular

Las/unas – the/some
feminine plural

Adjectives must change so they agree with the noun.

Mi padre es alto.

Mi madre es alta.

The feminine noun (la madre) has an 'a' at the end, whereas the masculine noun has an 'o'.

Possessive adjective and negatives

Mi – my and no - not

En mi casa hay – In my house there is

En mi casa no hay – In my house there is not
